Notes for pianist:

A tenuto marking means that the player may hold the note longer, perhaps "finger-pedaling," and perhaps stressing it more in volume, at their discretion, as in #4. A note may also have both a tenuto and an accent, as in #1, which indicates setting it in strong relief from the rest figuration that surrounds it, as a melody. In all cases, when the marking is on a two-note chord, note whether it is above or below that chord. If it stands below, accent only the bottom note of that chord, as in r.h., bars 15, 16, 17 etc. of #1. In some cases, as in #2, an arrow will specify a note in the middle of a three-note chord to be accented.

Courtesy accidentals are given in the following bar, unless the bar begins a new system. Sharps and flats are not repeated in separate voices. At times, cautionary accidentals are indicated with a parentheses, when the same note appears in unison, or within the same bar, as a natural and sharp/flat.

Fingerings are given here and there, only as suggestions, always with the aim of achieving legato with minimal or no damper pedal.

Fourteen Reveries runs 38-42 minutes in performance.
